Proper care and maintenance of ceramics and glass



Proper care and maintenance of your family heirlooms and works of art will ensure that they are available for future generations to enjoy





The primary means by which ceramics and glass objects deteriorate is through accidental cracking and breaking, often the result of improper handling



Always overestimate the brittleness and underestimate the strength of an artifact



Carry one object at a time, and place your hands around the body of the object rather than using an existing handle, rim or spout



Store and display on a sturdy, level surface that is secure from bumps and jarring; objects should be covered or enclosed to protect them from dirt and dust





- If this is not possible, wrap pieces in acidfree, lignin-free tissue and store in strong, secure acid-free cardboard boxes
- Newspaper should not be used for storage as it can cause discoloration and stains




- Ceramics and glass objects should be kept free of dust, debris and oily residues
- In general, it is not a good idea to routinely wash these pieces; it is much better to protect them from dirt





Porous ceramics, like earthenware, should never be immersed in water



 Leaving liquids inside vessels for long periods of time can damage glass





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
